Interactive Activities:

Practical Activity 1. Community Engagement Workshop (40 minutes)

1. **Objective:** To implement strategies for Effective Engagement

2. **Preparation:**

- Hypothetical Scenarios to analyse

Scenario 1: The Retreat in the Remote Village

Activity 2: Skill Development Mini-Workshops based in Storytelling (40 minutes)

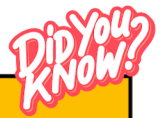
